BRIEF HISTORIC NARRATIVE:	The Florida Theater opened on September 10, 1928 to great fanfare. Built at a cost of \$150,000 (or by some accounts, a quarter of a million dollars), it was said to rank with the finest theaters in the entire South, though it clearly was not as elaborate or as large-scale as the Tampa Theatre (1926) or Jacksonville's Florida Theatre (1927). The theater boasted of having the Vitaphone system, which was a type of sound system used on feature films and shorts made by Warner Brother Studios in the late 1920s. The building had an 800-seat capacity and



featured some of the most cutting edge fire suppression features for its time. The end of WWII and the fervent construction of houses for returning soldiers and their families began a trend for residents to start moving away from the downtown to suburbs, which led to the closing of the theater.

In 1974 the building experienced another major era when it became "The Great Southern Music Hall". For almost a decade, the Great Southern Music Hall would put Gainesville on the musical cultural map in the South. A number of nationally and internationally recognized bands, comedians, and entertainers would perform here. The Music Hall would last less than a decade, however, as the three young attorneys who had created the venue were moving on in their own careers.

Other attempts to restore and reinvigorate the old movie palace took place in subsequent years. By the 1990s, the building was host to various dance parties, all-night raves and other events that were mostly attended by college students. This use proved to be unsustainable, and the theater was once again shuttered, becoming more derelict as time went on.

The current owner, Bill Bryson, purchased the Florida Theatre in 2017. Mr. Bryson has an extensive background in music venues and concert promotions; he once owned and operated the locally famous Covered Dish in Gainesville from 1992-2000. He hopes to bring back the Florida Theater to its former glory as a music venue for the community and as a catalyst for other revitalization projects in downtown Gainesville.

BUILDING DESCRIPTION

The two story brick building is now a part of a continuous row of commercial structures along the 200 block of West University Avenue.

The interior of the building has been fairly gutted over the years. The original seats were replaced in a 1980s renovation and then the seats were removed entirely when the building became a massive dance-hall.

Amazingly, most of the original exterior fenestration and original ornamentation on the exterior is still intact.

Stylistically, it has been called many things, from colonial revival (Florida Master Site File) to commercial brick with Neo-Federal Details (also FMSF),



to Neoclassical, to what is probably the most accurate description, a simplistic version of Adamesque Revival.

Adamesque Revival is a form of Neoclassical architecture, but exhibits those decorative motifs most often used by Robert Adams and his brothers, including medallions, urns, vine scrolls and pilasters.

The building features brick quoins at the corners, decorative urns topping the parapet, triplet window sets separated by engaged pilasters, and terra cotta medallions. A more detailed architectural description appears in the designation report.

Though the ground floor of the theatre has lost much of its original integrity, it is the current owner's vision to bring back the original marquee canopy and ground floor design.

CRITERIA FOR DESIGNATION: CRITERIA FOR DESIGNATION

The City of Gainesville's Historic Preservation Ordinance is modeled after federal criteria for evaluation found in the *Code of Federal Regulations, Title 36, Part 60,* and as set forth in City of Gainesville Land Development Code Section 30-4.28 (C)(3), Review Criteria.

All potential designation resources are evaluated to determine if the quality of significance in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering, and culture is present in the districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association.

The Florida Theater is significant under the following criteria, as set forth in Section 30-4.28 (C)(3):

Criterion (a): Is associated with events or persons that are significant to our local, state, or national history; and

Criterion (b): Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction.



Throughout its lifetime, the Florida Theater hosted hundreds of thousands of theater and concert patrons, playing an integral part in the early development of Gainesville's core downtown. The venue opened with great fanfare in 1928 where it showed one of the first talking pictures, "The Four Walls," starring John Gilbert and Joan Crawford. For many decades, it served as a music and concert venue, hosting some of the county's most famous musicians and band performances, including Tom Petty, Jerry Lee Lewis, Bo Diddley, Ray Charles, Melissa Manchester, Dave Brubeck, BB King, Elvis Bishop, Jimmy Buffet, Ike and Tina Turner, Patti LaBelle, Greg Allman, Steppenwolf, and many more. The Florida Theater fulfills Criterion (a): associated with events or persons that are significant to our local, state, or national history.

The two-story brick building exhibits Adamesque Revival details including turned balusters, sunburst panels above the central windows, and stone and brick quoining. Some alterations have occurred on the primary façade over the years, including a change to the marquee and the enclosure of the ground floor picture window storefronts. The marquee had already been altered by the 1940s and therefore this version maintains historic significance in its own right. Other original architectural features on the primary façade remain intact. The building fulfills Criterion (b): *embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction.*

RECOMMENDATION

FROM STAFF: Staff recommends that application request to make the Florida Theater, located at 233 West University Avenue a locally historic site be forwarded to the City Commission for final approval with support from the Historic Preservation Board.




