# Criminal Investigations Bureau

## **CR#21-17917 and CR#21-18603 (Point West Home Invasion/Attempted Murder)**

December 28, 2021 – Dennis Singleton Jr., Dekwan Howard, and Antonio Bowers Jr. were detained and eventually arrested for loitering/prowling and firearms charges in the area of Point West Apartments following an attempted homicide/shooting.

The trio was placed on ankle monitors for the initial charges. Additionally, a victim came forward advising the same trio had committed a home invasion robbery of the same apartment on December 13, 2021.

Firearms stolen during the home invasion robbery were recovered in the trio's vehicle on December 28<sup>th</sup> and FDLE analysis later confirmed that these firearms were used to shoot the apartment and victim on December 28<sup>th</sup>.

March 29, 2022 – Singleton, Howard, and Bowers were arrested for the home invasion robbery and for shooting into an occupied dwelling (the victim from December 28<sup>th</sup> was uncooperative and they could not be charged with attempted homicide).

## INVESTIGATION CONTINUING

During the investigation into the Point West cases, a witness advised that Singleton, Howard, and Bowers were also responsible for the spree of business robberies.

Review of surveillance video from the business robberies showed that their physical descriptions matched the trio and once they were placed on ankle monitors, the robbery spree stopped. Additionally, Singleton's vehicle was observed in the area of each robbery.

Search warrants executed on Howard and Singleton's residences recovered gloves, face masks, and other clothing items that matched the surveillance footage from the robbery spree

Further evidence to include DNA was gathered throughout the lengthy investigation and GPD collaborated with both ASO and MCSO to develop probable cause to charge Singleton, Howard, and Bowers on multiple counts of armed robbery in addition to their original charges. They are currently being held at the ASO DOJ with bonds ranging from \$1,300,000 to \$2,100,000.





# Criminal Investigations Bureau

## Drug Task Force

In May 2020, following an early morning shootout at Cabana Beach Apartments three gunmen forced their way into an apartment occupied by:

- Montayvious “Jabo” McKinnon (25yo)
- Tremayne “Mayne” Frazier (25yo)
- Byron Jones 30
- Keldric Bradley 26.

GPD Patrol entered the apartment to conduct a safety sweep and observed cash, drugs, a gun and bullet casings strewn throughout the common area along with bullet holes in the ceiling, furniture and walls shared with adjoining neighboring apartments. After determining the shootout, GPD Patrol and GPD Detectives determined the home invasion robbery was most likely associated with the illegal substances and large amount of cash located in the apartment. Gainesville-Alachua County Drug Task Force detectives then responded to investigate.



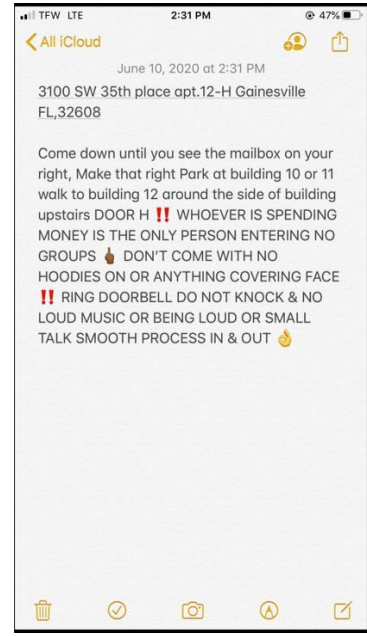

## Drug Task Force

During a search of the common area and bedrooms belonging to each of the four men, detectives found more than \$32,000 in cash, 28 pounds of marijuana and THC products, minor amounts of cocaine and pharmaceuticals, and two firearms. When detectives searched McKinnon's rental car that was located in the parking lot, they discovered nearly a pound of MDMA (later determined to be THC), 43 THC cartridges and two scales.

Two months after the shooting, the Gainesville drug task force arranged the purchase of illegal THC marijuana from Frazier, who was now living at Rocky Point Apartments with McKinnon, Bradley, and a fourth individual, 26-year-old David Lee Gordon Jr. A search of the Rocky Point apartment the following several months of investigation revealed more than \$16,000 in cash, two handguns and 69 pounds of drugs, including 486 THC cartridges and 453 pre-rolled marijuana cigarettes, twice as much illegal THC marijuana than at Cabana Beach Apartments.







# Criminal Investigations Bureau

## Drug Task Force

Just prior to jury selection the five individuals negotiated a plea deal and received the following sentences:

- Montayvious McKinnon - 10 years prison, 5 years probation for racketeering, trafficking in narcotics
- Tremayne Frazier – 7 years prison, 5 years probation for racketeering and tampering with evidence.
- Keldric Monte Bradley – 2.5 years in prison, 5 years for possession of a controlled substance with intent to sell.
- David Lee Gordon – 5 years in prison, 5 years probation for conspiracy to sell controlled substance, possession with intent to sell, unlawful use of a two way communication device and possession and maintain a structure where drugs are sold.
- Byron Demetrius Jones – 2.5 years in prison, 5 years probation for possession and maintain a structure where drugs are sold and possession with intent to sell a controlled substance.

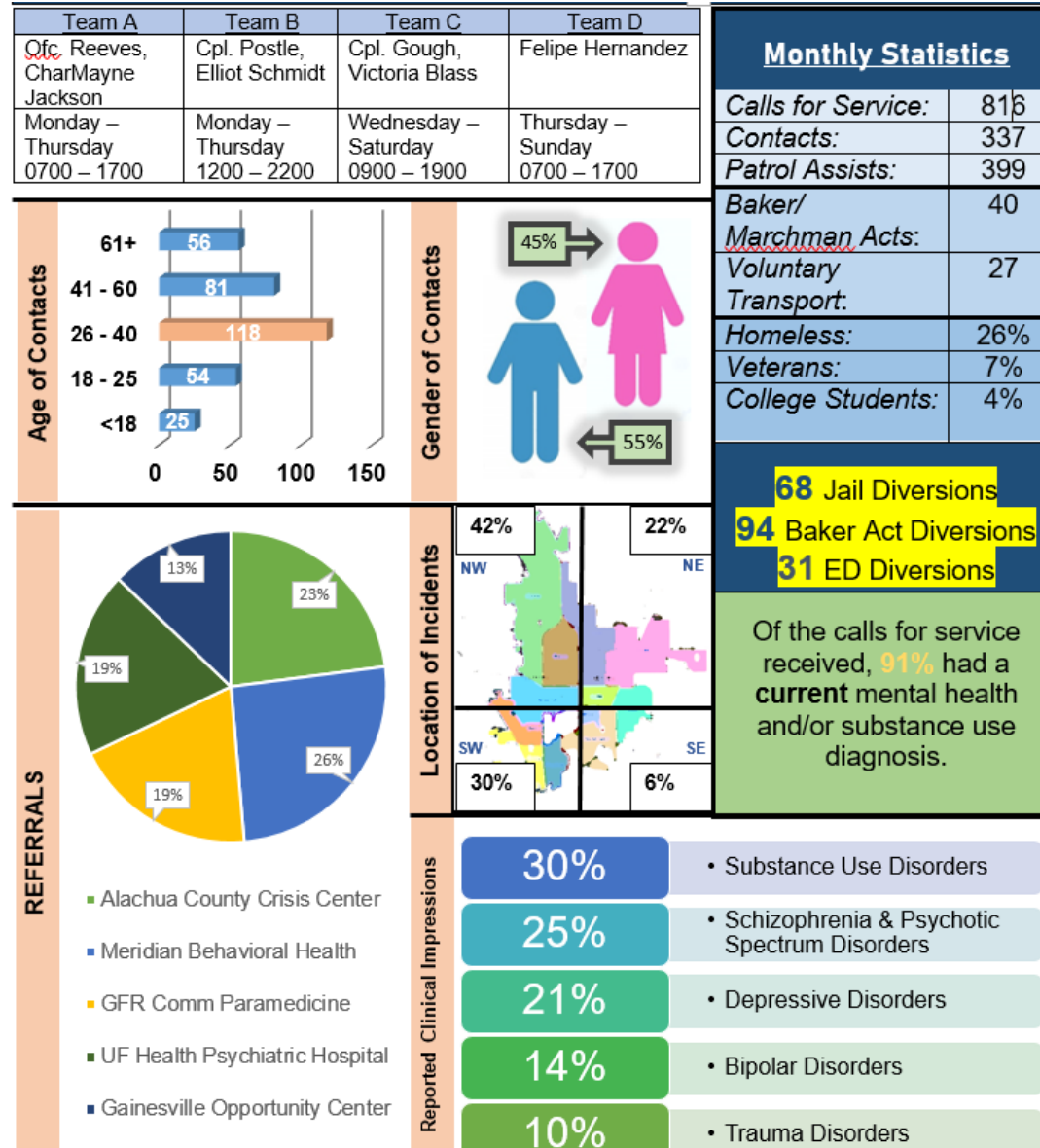
Serious Bodily Injury (THI Responded): 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter 2021 - 5

## Co-Responder Team (3rd Quarter 2022)

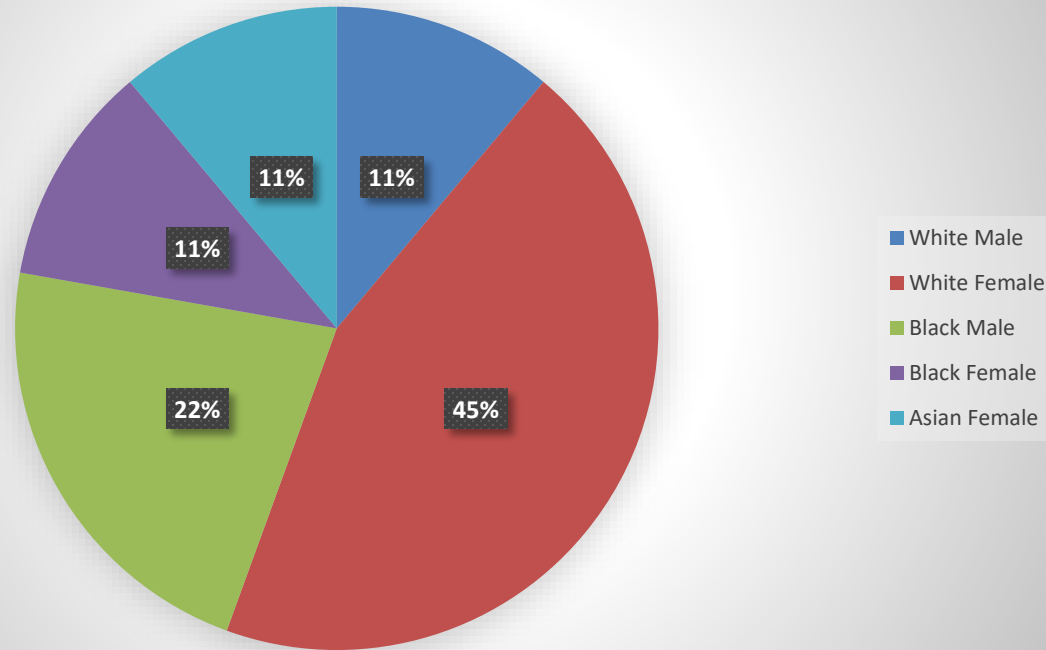

Four teams, each consisting of a uniformed police officer and a Master's level Mental Health Clinician, respond to calls for service involving individuals in crisis. The goal is to divert those experiencing mental illness away from the criminal justice system and into the most appropriate mental health resources.

# Youth Services

## The Crime Prevention

During the reporting period, CPU was able to assist there (3) new Neighborhoods establish or re-establish their Crime Watch groups. We also attended four (4) community outreach events on behalf of our agency. The Unit also assisted with the Pine Ride neighborhood reactivation as Community First Neighborhood designation.



## BOLD

The BOLD Program went through a staffing transition. We had one individual reach the milestone of completing his high school diploma from North Central Florida Charter School. One member is scheduled to graduate from Knoxville College this quarter. We anticipate employing Intervention specialists in November of 2022.



## Reichert House Youth Academy

RHYA participated in several community service projects, including the distribution of flyers for the City's Community Fair and other important meetings. The Reichert House has started their fall operations with the students which also include academics and, life skills and gun violence prevention. The Reichert House assisted in partnership with the program Women Working with Women in food distribution to over 600 families. The youth were volunteered to provide neighborhood clean up for vulnerable neighbors in our community following the passage of Hurricane Ian.



# GPD Cadet

## COG Cadet Program

Over the last several weeks representatives from GFR, GRU, and GPD have met in person several times to discuss the core curriculum for this program as well as specialized training for each individual career path.

We have also met with Trenton Hightower, curriculum developer for SFC and representatives from Career Source. We are on track to begin advertising in November and kicking the program off in January.





# GPD Explorers and JPA

- Meaningful Law Enforcement and accountability to the community will be an essential underpinning of our strategies. In an effort to foster those strategies, we have held over 8 listening sessions throughout our community. Although there were similar comments in all of the sessions, the most apparent commonality is that they all want to see an end to the violence.
- The Explorers are our High School age youth that have shown an interest in Law Enforcement and volunteer their time to helping us during community oriented events.
- For our communities younger aged children we offer a two week Junior Police Academy for Middle School students with similar interests in the summer. These programs help to give understanding and experience to our youth early and hopefully nurture their interest in what we do.

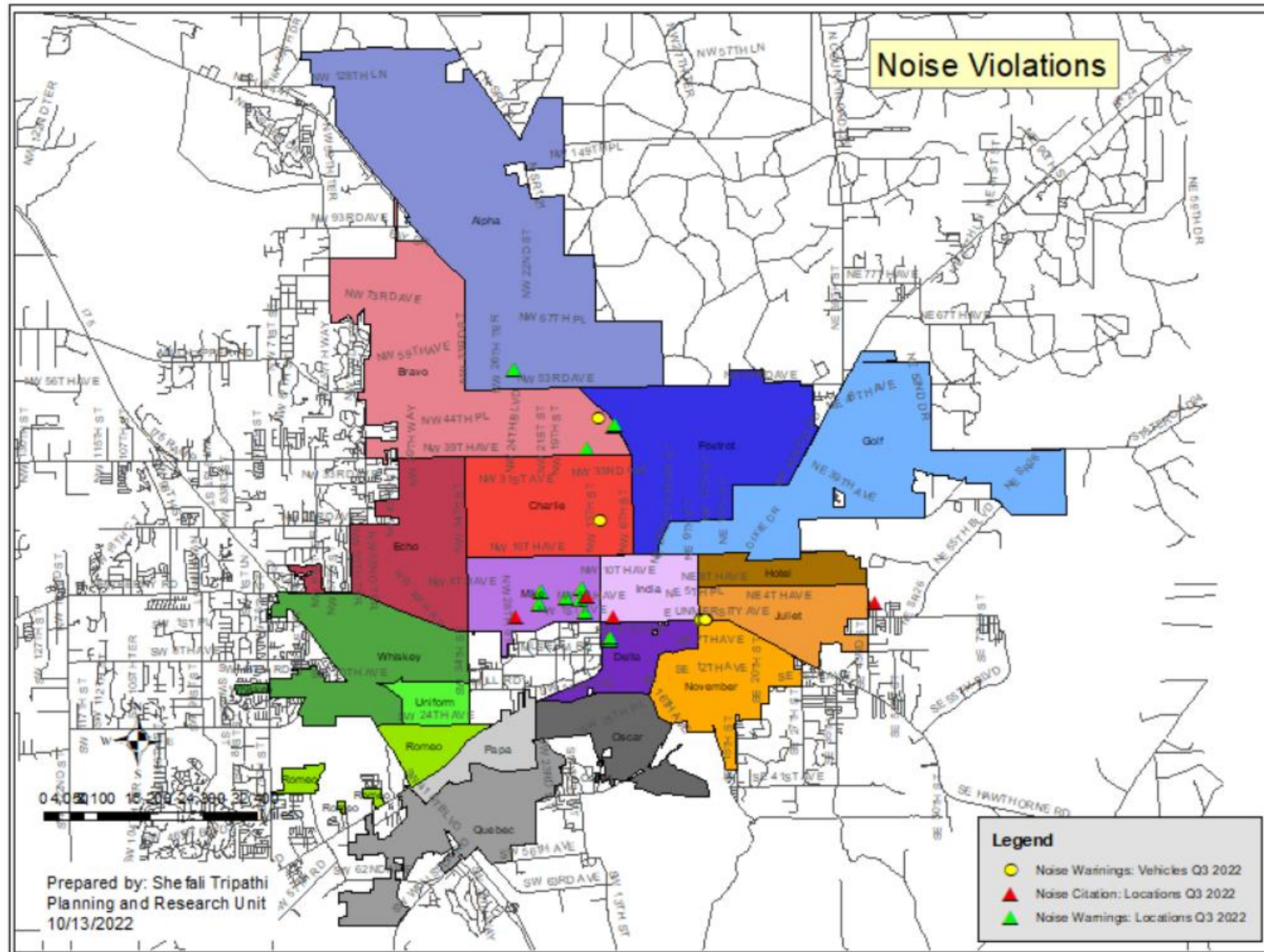
