City Manager Russ
Blackburn rejected the five
finalists for the job.

In a surprising announcement,
Gainesville City Manager Russ
Blackburn threw out a pool of five
finalists for Gainesville chief of police
and on Thursday selected interim
Chief Tony Jones, who had not applied
for the position.

"It's not very often you get to select someone who is revered," Blackburn said of Jones, who in accepting the position did not commit to serve more than a year.

Blackburn emphasized that the nationwide search that fielded 93 candidates helped him realize Jones

was the most qualified candidate, and then the arm twisting began.

Jones, a 53-year-old retired Gainesville Police Department captain, had said when the process to find a chief first began that his family commitments would prevent him from accepting the chief position permanently, and thus he did not apply for the position.

As a retired city employee, he will draw a city pension and a salary while serving as chief.

Jones served as interim chief after former Chief Norman Botsford retired earlier than expected in July, and on Wednesday Jones agreed to step into the role for at least a year.

"We're still twisting," Blackburn joked after announcing his selection and expressing hope that Jones would stay in the position longer.


When asked what had changed his

mind, Jones said, "Right now is a pivotal time for the police department. (The National Organization of Black Law Enforcement) will give us ... solutions or recommendations we hope to implement, and I want to be there to see that some of those plans be implemented."

NOBLE was hired by the city to review the Gainesville Police Department's internal policies following a difficult year in which five officers resigned amid internal investigations and three officers were disciplined for harassing prostitutes and drug dealers while off-duty.

Several sources indicated one of Jones' strengths comes from the fact that he was outside the Botsford administration under which the, scandals occurred but also that Jones had the institutional knowledge that
