7	WHEREAS, the City of Gainesville, Florida ("City") is a duly constituted municipality having such
8	power and authority conferred upon it by the Florida Constitution and the Municipal Home Rule
9	Powers Act; and
10	WHEREAS, the Municipal Home Rule Powers Act, Chapter 166, Florida Statutes, secures for
11	municipalities the broad exercise of home rule powers granted by Article VIII, Section 2 of the
12	Florida Constitution, including the exercise of any power for municipal purposes not expressly
13	prohibited by law; and
14	WHEREAS, the City Commission has determined that the changes to the Code of Ordinances as
15	provided in this ordinance serve a valid public purpose and are in the best interest of the public
16	health, safety, and general welfare of the City; and
17	WHEREAS, at least ten days' notice has been given once by publication in a newspaper of general
18	circulation notifying the public of this proposed ordinance and of public hearings to be held by
19	the City Commission; and
20	WHEREAS, the public hearings were held pursuant to the published notice described at which
21	hearings the parties in interest and all others had an opportunity to be and were, in fact, heard.
22	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF GAINESVILLE,

- 1 **SECTION 1.** Section 4-1 in Article I of Chapter 4 of the Code of Ordinances of Gainesville,
- 2 Florida, is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 3 Chapter 4 ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES
- 4 ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL
- 5 **Section 4-1. Definitions.**
- 6 (a) The definitions contained in the beverage law of the state, as defined in F.S. chs. 561, 563
 7 and 564, and interpreted by the courts of this state and the state director of the division
 8 of alcoholic beverages and tobacco of the department of business and professional
 9 regulation, shall apply to the terms in this chapter.
- (b) Open container shall mean any bottle, can, glass, cup or other vessel, containing an 10 11 alcoholic beverage, other than 1) the original unbroken sealed container or 2) a container of an alcoholic beverage, resealed or sealed by the alcoholic beverage licensee pursuant 12 to F.S. §§ 561.20(2)(a)4., 564.09 or 565.045; provided however, that if a container of 13 alcoholic beverage is resealed or sealed by the alcoholic beverage licensee pursuant to 14 F.S. §§ 561.20(2)(a)4., 564.09 or 565.045, is transported in a motor vehicle, the resealed 15 container shall be considered an open container unless it is placed in a locked glove 16 17 compartment, a locked trunk, or the area behind the last upright seat of a motor vehicle that is not equipped with a trunk. 18
- 19 (c) Alcohol event permit means a permit issued pursuant to section 4-4 of this Code that 20 allows the temporary sale of beer, wine or other alcoholic beverages.
- 21 (d) Not-for-profit entity means an entity qualified under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal 22 Revenue Code and registered pursuant to F.S. ch. 496.
- 23 The definitions contained in the alcoholic beverage laws of the state, as defined in F.S. chs. 561,
- 24 563, and 564, and interpreted by the courts of this state and the state director of the division of
- alcoholic beverages and tobacco of the department of business and professional regulation,
- apply to the terms in this chapter. In addition, the following words and phrases have the
- 27 meaning indicated.
- 28 <u>(a) Alcohol event permit means a permit issued pursuant to section 4-4 of this Code that</u> 29 allows the temporary sale of beer, wine, or other alcoholic beverages.
- 30 (b) Not-for-profit entity means an entity qualified under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
 31 Revenue Code and registered pursuant to F.S. ch. 496.
- 32 (c) Open container means any bottle, can, glass, cup, or other vessel containing an alcoholic
 33 beverage, other than 1) the original unbroken sealed container or 2) a container of an
 34 alcoholic beverage resealed or sealed by the alcoholic beverage licensee pursuant to F.S.
 35 §§ 561.20(2)(a)4., 564.09, or 565.045; provided however, that if a container of alcoholic
 36 beverage that is resealed or sealed by the alcoholic beverage licensee pursuant to F.S. §§

- 561.20(2)(a)4., 564.09, or 565.045 is transported in a motor vehicle, the resealed container is considered an open container unless it is placed in a locked glove compartment, a locked trunk, or the area behind the last upright seat of a motor vehicle that is not equipped with a trunk.
- 5 (d) Public right-of-way means land dedicated or deeded to, made available to, or used by the 6 general public as a street, alley, walkway, sidewalk, boulevard, or for public ingress or 7 egress.

- **SECTION 2.** Section 4-4 in Article I of Chapter 4 of the Code of Ordinances of Gainesville,
- 10 Florida, is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 11 Chapter 4 ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES
- 12 Article I. IN GENERAL
- 13 Sec. 4-4. Sale, dispensing, consumption, and possession generally.
 - (a) Generally. Except as specifically allowed by this section, it shall be unlawful for any person to sell, distribute, consume or possess any alcoholic beverage in any open container on any property owned by the city or on any public right-of-way, including without limitation, streets, thoroughfares, highways or sidewalks. Any person or legal entity that is allowed to sell or dispense alcoholic beverages pursuant to this section shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws related to the sale or dispensing of alcoholic beverages. The city manager is authorized to promulgate written administrative procedures to implement this section and any alcohol event permits authorized herein.
 - (b) City-owned property; city or county-owned parking lots and garages. It shall be is unlawful for any person to sell, dispense, possess, or consume any alcoholic beverages beverage open container on any property owned by the city, or on any parking lot or garage owned by the city or Alachua County, except as follows:
 - (1) At the airport terminal facility and the municipal golf course facility when being sold or dispensed by the facility owner or by a natural person or legal entity that is under contract with the facility owner;
 - (2) <u>Dispensing, possession, and consumption, but not sale, within Within-</u>the rental event space <u>during an event</u> at the Thomas Center, the Thelma Bolton Center, Boulware Springs, and the Senior Recreation Center, <u>dispensing, but not sale, for consumption during an event for which the space is rented</u>. A fundraising event sponsored by a governmental or other public entity or a not-for-profit entity that charges admission for the event, but does not charge for the purchase of the alcoholic beverages, is not considered the sale of alcoholic beverages. The rental agreement may specify such terms and conditions as may be required by the city in its sole discretion as owner of the property.

(3) During a special event produced by the city, pursuant to written policy of the city. The city manager is authorized to promulgate a written policy to govern the process and contract terms and conditions under which the city may select not-for-profit entities to sell or dispense alcoholic beverages during a city produced special event.

- (4) On other property that the city makes available for special events produced by private parties, pursuant to written policy of the city. The city manager is authorized to promulgate a written policy to govern the process and terms and conditions under which the city may issue an alcohol event permit for the sale, dispensing, consumption, or possession of alcoholic beverages on particular parcels of city-owned property. The city commission shall determine which particular parcels, if any, are made available for such events.
- (53) On property that is leased to a private party pursuant to the city's real estate policy, if the sale, dispensing, possession, and consumption of alcoholic beverages is expressly allowed under the terms of the lease agreement. The lease may specify such terms and conditions as may be required by the city in its sole discretion as owner of the property.
- (4) Within city-owned public parks as may be authorized by article IV (arts, culture, and entertainment districts) of chapter 4 of the Code of Ordinances or by section 18-20 of chapter 18 of the Code of Ordinances.
- (5) Within property that is part of a special event as may be authorized by the Code of Ordinances.
- 22 (c) Public right-of-way. It shall be is unlawful for any person to sell, dispense distribute, consume, or possess any alcoholic beverage in any open container on any city or other public right-of-way, including without limitation, streets, thoroughfares, highways or sidewalks, except as follows:
 - (1) Within a sidewalk café that is licensed in accordance with the city's Land Development Code.
 - (2) Within any arts, culture, and entertainment districts as may be authorized by article IV of chapter 4 of the Code of Ordinances.
 - (<u>32</u>) At an outdoor event, within the downtown district as shown in Figure 1, pursuant to an alcohol event permit. Within property that is part of a special event as may be authorized by the Code of Ordinances.

Figure 1. Downtown District (NOTE TO CODIFIER: Please delete this figure.)

The city manager, or designee, is authorized to issue an alcohol event permit for the sale of beer and wine associated with an outdoor event organized, produced, and managed by a governmental or other public entity or a not-for-profit entity, subject to the following:

a. An alcohol event permit application must be submitted by the event organizer, on the form provided by the city, along with payment of the fee set forth in Appendix A of this Code. b. The alcohol event permit application shall include a site plan sketch showing the location, access, barriers delineating the event site from other public areas, and all other pertinent details of the site; a report detailing the dates and times during which the event will be conducted, the estimated number of people expected to attend, the capacity of any proposed temporary structures, the capacity of the event site, whether there will be outdoor entertainment, a plan for the installation of temporary sanitary facilities, a plan for the storage and pickup of solid waste

 ordinance.

c. The alcohol event permit application shall be reviewed by the appropriate departments of the city to ensure protection of the public health, safety and general welfare. In addition to normal concerns of each such department, particular attention will be given to traffic flow and control, auto and pedestrian safety, noise and the effect that the use and activity will have on surrounding uses, particularly where the adjoining or nearby use is residential.

during and after the event; and a public safety plan detailing how the applicant

will maintain crowd control and public safety, and comply with the city's noise

- d. The alcohol event permit may be approved or denied by the city manager or designee based on compliance with this subsection. The city manager or designee may impose additional special conditions as deemed necessary to protect the public health, safety and general welfare.
- e. Each alcohol event permit issued shall be subject to the following conditions, requirements and limitations, as well as any other special conditions stated in the permit.
 - 1. A sufficient number of off-duty law enforcement officers and fire-rescue personnel, as determined by the city, shall be employed by the permittee to provide security, crowd control and emergency medical services for the event.
 - 2. The permittee shall indemnify the city, its elected and appointed officers, employees, and agents from any claim for personal injury, including death, or property damage, including destruction, associated with the event. This indemnification shall be in the form of an insurance policy acceptable to the city's risk manager, which that names the city as an additional insured and is endorsed to provide a separate aggregate of a minimum of \$1,000,000.00 for the event. In addition, the permittee shall procure a liquor liability policy with not less than \$1,000,000.00 of coverage that also names the city as an additional insured.
 - 3. The event may only be held on such streets, sidewalks and rights of way as the city deems appropriate for temporary closure in its sole discretion.

4. The event may be open to the public only during such hours as the city deems 1 2 appropriate in its sole discretion. Each event shall be limited to a maximum of 3 72 consecutive hours, inclusive of time for set-up and clean-up. 5. The sale, dispensing and consumption of beer and wine shall occur only within 4 an area secured by fencing or barricades that are a minimum of four feet in 5 height and with limited points of entry and exit. The permittee shall not allow 6 alcoholic beverages purchased outside of the event to be brought into or 7 consumed inside the permitted event area. Nor shall the event organizer 8 9 allow beer or wine sold inside the secured area to be taken out of, or 10 consumed outside of, the secured area. f. Only two alcohol event permits may be issued per calendar year per applicant. 11 However, one alcohol event permit may include all of the University of Florida 12 home football games for the school year. 13 Outdoors on property owned by parties other than the city. It shall be is unlawful for any 14 (d) person to sell any alcoholic beverage in an open container outdoors on any property 15 owned by a party other than the city, except as follows: 16 (1) Within an outdoor seating area that is part of an approved use of property which is 17 18 zoned and permitted for the consumption of alcoholic beverages. 19 (2) On property owned and managed/operated by the University of Florida or Alachua County, provided the university or the county (as applicable) ensures the protection 20 of the public health, safety, and general welfare. In particular, attention should be 21 22 given to traffic flow and control, auto and pedestrian safety, noise, and the effect that the use and activity will have on surrounding uses, particularly where the adjoining or 23 24 nearby use is residential. (3) Within property that is part of a special event as may be authorized by the Code of 25 Ordinances. At a temporary outdoor event on property that is located in a business, 26 mixed-use, or industrial zoning district as classified in the city's land development 27 code; or at a temporary outdoor event on property that is zoned planned 28 development (provided the planned development ordinance allows commercial or 29 mixed-uses and not solely residential uses); or in connection with a temporary sale for 30 31 fundraising by a nonprofit agency. Any such events shall require an alcohol event permit issued by the city manager or designee as follows: 32 a. All alcohol event permit applications shall be submitted by the event organizer to 33 the city, on the form provided by the city, along with payment of the fee set forth 34 in Appendix A of this Code. If the event is conducted within common area, the 35 applicant must obtain the written consent of the owner(s) or manager (if the 36 37 owners utilize a manager for such purposes) of the common area on the permit application. 38

b. All alcohol event permit applications must include a site plan sketch showing the location, access, barriers delineating the temporary sale from other public areas

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1 2		and all other details of the site; a report detailing the dates and times during which the event will be conducted, the estimated number of people expected to attend,
3		the capacity of any proposed temporary structures, the capacity of the event site,
4		whether there will be outdoor entertainment, a plan for the installation of
5		temporary sanitary facilities, a plan for the storage and pickup of solid waste
6		during and after the event; and a public safety plan detailing how the applicant
7		will maintain crowd control and public safety, and comply with the city's noise
8		ordinance.

9		c. Alcohol event permit applications shall be examined by the appropriate
10		departments of the city to ensure protection of the public health, safety and
11		general welfare. In addition to normal concerns of each such department,
12		particular attention will be given to traffic flow and control, auto and pedestrian
13		safety, noise and the effect that the use and activity will have on surrounding uses,
14		particularly where the adjoining use is residential.
15		d. The alcohol event permit may be approved or denied by the city manager or
16		designee based on compliance with this subsection. The city manager or designee
17		may impose additional special conditions as deemed necessary to protect the
18		public health, safety and general welfare.
19		e. Only six (6) alcohol event permits may be issued per calendar year per applicant
20		per location. However, one alcohol event permit may include all of the University
21		of Florida home football games for the school year.
21		
22		f. Each alcohol event permit issued shall be subject to the following conditions,
23		requirements and limitations, as well as any other special conditions stated in the
24		permit.
25		1. A sufficient number of off-duty law enforcement officers and EMS personnel,
26		as determined by the city, shall be employed by the permittee to provide
27		security, crowd control and emergency medical services for the event.
28		2. The event may be open to the public only during the hours 10:00 a.m. to 2:00
29		a.m. the following day. Each event shall be limited to 48 consecutive hours,
30		inclusive of time for set-up and clean-up.
31		3. The sale, dispensing, consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages shall
32		occur only within an area secured by fencing or barricades a minimum of four
33		feet in height and with limited points of entry and exit. The permittee shall
34		not allow alcoholic beverages purchased outside of the permitted area to be
35		brought into or consumed inside the permitted area. Nor shall the permittee
36		allow alcoholic beverages sold inside the permitted area to be taken out of, or
37		consumed outside of the permitted area.
38	(e)	Alcohol special event permits, generally. An application for an alcohol event permit may
39		not be submitted more than six months prior to the first day of the event. If the city
40		manager or designee determines that an event is creating a clear and present danger of


a riot or other general public disorder, or substantial injury to persons or to property, the city manager or designee may require the immediate cessation of the sale, dispensing, consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages or may require the immediate cessation of the vent. In addition, if the city manager or designee finds that the requirements or conditions of an alcohol event permit have been violated, and not cured within a reasonable time after reasonable notice to the permit holder, the city manager or designee may require the immediate cessation of the sale, dispensing, consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages or may require the immediate cessation of the event. The city manager or designee may approve an alcohol special event permit pursuant to this section to allow: 1) the sale, dispersion, possession, or consumption of alcoholic beverage open containers on city-owned property or public rights-of-way; or 2) the sale of alcoholic beverage open containers outdoors on property owned by a party other than the city. Alcohol special event permits are allowable only on property that is located in a business, mixed-use, or industrial zoning district as classified in the city's land development code, or on property that is zoned planned development (provided the planned development ordinance allows commercial or mixed-uses and not solely residential uses). Any such event requires an alcohol special event permit issued by the city manager or designee as follows:

- (1) All alcohol event permit applications must be submitted by the event organizer to the city, on the form provided by the city, along with payment of the fee set forth in Appendix A of this Code. If the event is conducted within common area, the applicant must obtain the written consent of the owner(s) or manager (if the owners use a manager for such purposes) of the common area on the permit application.
- (2) All alcohol special event permit applications must include: a site plan sketch showing the location, access, barriers delineating the temporary sale from other public areas, and all other details of the site; a report detailing the dates and times during which the event will be conducted; the estimated number of people expected to attend, and the capacity of any proposed temporary structures and the capacity of the event site; whether there will be outdoor entertainment; a plan for the installation of temporary sanitary facilities; a plan for the storage and pickup of solid waste during and after the event; a public safety plan detailing how the applicant will maintain crowd control and public safety; and a plan detailing how the applicant will comply with the city's noise ordinance.
- (3) Alcohol special event permit applications must be examined by the appropriate departments of the city to ensure protection of the public health, safety, and general welfare. In addition to normal concerns of each such department, particular attention will be given to traffic flow and control, auto and pedestrian safety, noise, and the effect that the use and activity will have on surrounding uses, particularly where any adjacent areas are residential.
- (4) The alcohol special event permit may be approved or denied by the city manager or designee based on compliance with this subsection. The city manager or designee has

the sole discretion to determine whether the temporary closure of city-owned property or public rights-of-way is appropriate for an alcohol special event permit.

- (5) Each alcohol special event permit issued will be subject to the following conditions, requirements, and limitations, as well as any additional special conditions that the city manager or designee may impose as deemed necessary to protect the public health, safety, and general welfare.
 - a. A sufficient number of off-duty law enforcement officers and EMS personnel, as determined by the city, must be employed by the permittee to provide security, crowd control, and emergency medical services for the event.
 - b. The event may be open to the public only during the hours 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. the following day. Each event is limited to 72 consecutive hours, inclusive of time for set-up and clean-up. The city manager or designee may further restrict the hours and duration as necessary to protect the public health, safety, and general welfare.
 - c. If the city manager or designee determines that an event is creating a clear and present danger of a riot or other general public disorder, or substantial injury to persons or to property, the city manager or designee may require the immediate cessation of the sale, dispensing, consumption, and possession of alcoholic beverages or may require the immediate cessation of the event. In addition, if the city manager or designee finds that the requirements or conditions of an alcohol event permit have been violated, and not cured within a reasonable time after reasonable notice to the permit holder, the city manager or designee may require the immediate cessation of the sale, dispensing, consumption, and possession of alcoholic beverages or may require the immediate cessation of the event.
 - d. The permittee shall indemnify the city, its elected and appointed officers, employees, and agents from any claim for personal injury, including death, or property damage, including destruction, associated with the event. In addition, the permittee shall provide an insurance policy acceptable to the city's risk manager, which names the city as an additional insured and is endorsed to provide a separate aggregate of a minimum of \$1,000,000 for the event. The permittee shall also provide a liquor liability policy with not less than \$1,000,000 of coverage, which names the city as an additional insured.
- (f) Penalties. The provisions of this section regarding the unlawful open consumption of and/or possession of an open container of alcoholic beverage, may be enforced by civil citation as provided in sections 2-236 through 2-339 of the Code, or by criminal citation, as provided in section 1-9 of the Code. Any person not in compliance with any section of this article shall be subject to the penalties designated in sections 1-9 or 2-339 of this Code. Each violation shall be considered a separate offense, which can be prosecuted separately.

- 1 **SECTION 3.** Article IV of Chapter 4 of the Code of Ordinances of Gainesville, Florida, is hereby
- 2 amended to read as follows:
- 3 Chapter 4 ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES
- 4 Article IV. ARTS, CULTURE, AND ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICTS
- ⁵ Sec. 4-57. Purpose.
- 6 The purpose of this article is to encourage community vibrancy and the economic success
- 7 of entertainment, retail, and restaurant uses within a limited defined area of the city, hereafter
- 8 referred to as the entertainment district(s). The regulations within this article are intended to
- 9 support and enhance cultural event programming, restaurants, music venues, and arts
- 10 institutions located within the arts, culture, and entertainment districts while promoting
- pedestrian use, provide for more efficient and effective public safety enforcement in a defined
- area, foster a mutual relationship among commercial merchants and property owners, and
- 13 encourage private development of entertainment facilities which enhance and complement
- the use of public facilities.

- 17 The arts, culture, and entertainment districts subject to the provisions of this article are

- 3 As used in this article, the following words and phrases have the meanings indicated.
- 4 Alcoholic beverage(s) means those alcoholic beverages as defined in Chapters 561, 563, and
- 5 564, Florida Statutes, and as interpreted by the courts of this state and the state director of the
- 6 division of alcoholic beverages and tobacco of the department of business and professional
- 7 regulation, and includes beer, wine, and liquor, or any beverage containing any of the
- 8 foregoing.
- 9 Alcoholic beverage establishment means an alcoholic beverage dispensing establishment
- 10 located within any arts, culture, and entertainment district and which is licensed and permitted
- under state law to sell alcoholic beverages.
- 12 Arts, culture, and entertainment district(s) means the distinct area(s) within the boundaries of
- the arts, culture, and entertainment district(s) as set forth in section 4-58.

- **Open container** means as that term is defined in Section 4-1 of the Code of Ordinances.
- Outside means all sidewalks, streets, alleyways, and designated street crossing paths, public rights-of-way, and city-owned parks, unless specifically excluded by the city manager or designee to ensure protection of the public health, safety, and general welfare, which that are within the boundaries of any arts, culture, and entertainment district and beyond the premises of a licensed alcoholic beverage establishment. The boundaries of all arts, culture, and entertainment districts include the entirety of the particular public right-of-way making up the boundary, including as applicable the sidewalks located on both sides of the public right-of-way boundary. This definition does not include any areas within any parking lots or garages owned by either the city or Alachua County.

Sec. 4-60. – Outside consumption of alcoholic beverages.

Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary within the Code of Ordinances, persons of legal age to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages may, within the boundaries of the arts, culture, and entertainment districts, possess and consume an open container of an alcoholic beverage outside of the premises of alcoholic beverage establishments, subject to the following regulations:

- a. *Hours*. A person may possess and consume an open container of an alcoholic beverage outside of the licensed premises of an alcoholic beverage establishment, only within the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. Extended hours of consumption for special events may be granted pursuant to applicable sections of the Code of Ordinances.
- b. *Glass container prohibition*. Open containers of alcoholic beverages possessed or consumed outside within the arts, culture, and entertainment districts must not be made of glass.
- c. Notice of boundaries. Alcoholic beverage establishments shall post, at all points of egress from the licensed premises, a map of the boundaries of the arts, culture, and entertainment district in which it is located. Alcoholic beverage establishments shall also provide, either in electronic or paper form, a map of the arts, culture, and entertainment district upon request.
- d. *Enforcement*. Any person or alcoholic beverage establishment not in compliance with any provision of this article will be subject to the penalties designated in sections 1-9 or 2-339 of the Code of Ordinances. Each violation will be considered a separate offense, which can be prosecuted separately.

- **SECTION 4.** It is the intent of the City Commission that the provisions of Sections 1 through 3 of
- this ordinance become and be made a part of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Gainesville,

1	Florida, and that the sections and paragraphs of the Code of Ordinances may be renumbered or				
2	relettered in order to accomplish such intent.				
3	SECTION 5. If any word, phrase, clause, paragraph, section, or provision of this ordinance or the				
4	application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such finding				
5	will not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance that can be given effect				
6	without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application, and to this end the provisions of				
7	this ordinance are declared severable.				
8	SECTION 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are to the extent of such				
9	conflict hereby repealed.				
10	SECTION 7. This ordinance will become effective on January 1, 2024.
