TITLE: Resolution Recommending the Approval and Adoption of the University of Florida Climate Action Plan 2.0 by the Office of the President

WHEREAS, in April 2023, the University of Florida's Office of Sustainability completed its Climate Action Plan, referred to henceforth as CAP, 2.0 [1]; and,

WHEREAS, CAP 2.0 builds on UF's 1st Climate Action Plan launched in 2009 by and reaffirms the university's commitment to reaching carbon neutrality in 2025 [2]; and,

WHEREAS, CAP 2.0 recommends feasible strategies to "accelerate emissions reductions and develop carbon offset purchasing policies" through the following five target areas: energy & buildings, transportation, education & research, resilience, and offsets & finance" [3]; and,

WHEREAS, CAP 2.0 advocates for achieving LEED certifications for more UF buildings, increasing solar panel installation on campus, promoting less dependency on single-occupancy vehicles, integrating climate change-related curriculums and courses in all academic colleges, and purchasing high-quality carbon offset technologies [1]; and,

WHEREAS, weather and climate-related risks to Florida infrastructure have magnified in the past decade, particularly concerning infrastructure and residents in coastal locations, in the form of ocean acidification, increased frequency of extreme rainfall and tropical storm events, and magnified toxicity of algal blooms [4]; and,

WHEREAS, 67% of members who identify as Generation Z feel somewhat or extremely anxious about the impact of climate change according to the American Psychiatric Association [5]; then,

THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED that the University of Florida Student Senate recommends the Office of the President to grant administrative approval for CAP 2.0 before the end of the 2022-2023 UF fiscal year.

THEREFORE, LET IT FURTHER BE RESOLVED that the University of Florida Student encourages the Office of the President to immediately implement the adoption of CAP 2.0 in all cabinet offices, including the Office of Agriculture and Natural Resources, Office of Academic Affairs, and Office of Business Affairs.

THEREFORE, LET IT FINALLY BE RESOLVED that the University of Florida Student Senate emphasizes the need for the Office of the President to promote consistent communications with the Office of Sustainability to ensure the relevant target dates are reasonably met.

Askew Scholars Research Proposal

Background

Why does hostility often arise between college campuses and their surrounding communities? What are some viable solutions that can be developed to minimize this existing tension? These are just a few questions that I have often asked community members, University of Florida students, and even myself while engaging in civic engagement and public service efforts.

The transient nature of student involvement within the community, as well as its compounding effects over time, have developed a deep-rooted mistrust or hesitation within the Gainesville community to have UF students—and administrative officials—participate in ongoing outreach or service efforts. In addition, as UF continues to climb the rankings of public institutions and expands its operations further into Gainesville, the issue of campus and community relations has become more relevant than ever.

However, UF is not an isolated case. There have been recent calls on all universities to be more responsible and accountable to the city they are situated in. Existing research has shown that colleges play a key role in driving the economic growth of college towns while also shifting city relations.

Issue

My research project aims to outline key factors that contribute to the frictional relationship between college campuses and their surrounding communities, as well as solutions that can be adopted by two stakeholder groups to alleviate this tension. These stakeholder groups include the University of Florida and Gainesville community members. The UF stakeholder group includes students and administrators, and the Gainesville stakeholder group includes local nonprofit leaders and City of Gainesville employees (with a focus on their role as mediator between the university and Gainesville residents).

Research Methodology

Interviews: Interviews will be conducted with members of each stakeholder group to ascertain key concerns and potential solutions to the frictional relationship between university and city. For the University of Florida, staff members under the UF Office of Community Relations will be contacted, as well as student representatives from a variety of campus organizations, such as the Hispanic Student Association and Black Student Union. I hope to build off the Bob Graham Center's relationship with the City of Gainesville to speak to employees and city commission members. Lastly, I plan on listening to leaders of local nonprofits across a spectrum of community issues, including food insecurity, homelessness, education disparities, and racial equity.

Surveys: By working with my faculty mentor, we will develop a comprehensive survey for UF students and Gainesville community members to take to determine current satisfaction with university-town relations. The quantitative data generated from this survey will help us measure initial support for my proposed policy solutions.

Literature Reviews: To account for policy information that may not be directly available by interview, I plan on reviewing publicly available data on outreach and community engagement initiatives that UF has adopted in the past to determine the success of potential policy solutions.

Intended Audience and Outcome

After the initial round of quantitative survey data and qualitative interview data collection, I would like to host a series of public roundtables between the identified key stakeholders: UF administrators and students, City of Gainesville officials, and local nonprofits. Ideally, multiple sessions would be hosted to focus on how each stakeholder may adopt solutions and constructive practices to improve university-town relations. Each roundtable would be open to public comment to further facilitate dialogue.

Suggestions curated from the public roundtables would then be compiled into an accessible research report for distribution. By preparing a digestible review of community member concerns, as well as solutions to reduce abrasion between college campuses and surrounding communities, all stakeholders will be able to review the research findings and implement them into future collaborative efforts. I also plan on conducting one-on-one discussions with members of each stakeholder group, such as visiting student organization general body meetings, to inspire even more dialogue on how these identified strategies can be implemented. If funds and time permit, I would like to present my findings at research conferences and talk with officials and students at other universities to see how my findings may be replicated at other institutions and cities.
