Title: 2024-205 Approval of Surplus Property List (B)

**Department:** Sustainable Development

Description: Request for City Commission approval of a listing of proposed escheated

properties for future disposition.

Fiscal Note: None

**Explanation:** The City has acquired the proposed surplus properties listed in Exhibit "A" from Alachua County by County Deed due to non-payment of property taxes by the previous owners. The City adopted revised Real Property Policies on April 1, 2021 by Resolution No. 200961 (the "Policies") that govern the disposition of City-owned real property.

Pursuant to the Policies, prior to disposition of real property, the City Commission must first find and declare that the properties are surplus. The Policies define surplus as "...property which no longer serves a public purpose, or is in excess of the City's needs, or the sale of which would serve a greater public purpose than the retention of the property."

The listed properties, if approved, will be disposed of, according to the Policies, in order to support the City's housing goals, including the provision of permanent Affordable Housing, neighborhood enhancement and stabilization, infill development, and mitigation of the impacts on vulnerable communities from gentrification and displacement.
