

What We Heard

Programming desire is diverse, including all of the performing arts genres and include spoken word, visual arts/exhibits, festivals, arts education, summer camps, and humanities

The cultural center should speak to the needs of youth and adults in East Gainesville, and be a place with free space, programming and training (arts and life skills), and where there is support for *creativity*, *collaboration*, and *community gathering*

The space (performance, rehearsal, studio, office) should be safe, *accessible*, *affordable*, and *active* and evoke a sense of belonging and community pride

Organizational Information

- 42 respondents (including 2 individual artists)
- 55% of respondents have an annual budget < \$100,000
- Respondents cover a variety of audiences in the community
- 48% expressed strong interest in using the new facility

Activity & Facility Information

- Majority of the respondents have free programming in Gainesville.
- Free tickets are often offered
- Attendance levels vary by organizations


New Facility and Usage

- Most influential factors in choosing a new facility:

If you were to use a new facility, what type of space would you most likely use? (Check all that apply)




The New Facility Could Help Expand Programming


