### Proposed Text Amendment Land Development Code:

- Sec. 30-6.12 Outdoor Lighting
- City-initiated

#### **Summary of Request:**

- Amend LDC Sec. 30-6.12(E) Specific Illumination Requirements
- Add new subsection 30-6.12(E)(3) City parks
- Exempt city nature parks, centers and conservation areas from minimum and average horizonal illuminances within 30-6.12(E)

#### 2024-410B Land Development Code - Proposed Amendment 30-6.12(E) Specific Illumination Requirements

- City parks. Within park facilities listed under Section 18-18, the following shall apply:
  - a) Nature parks, centers and conservation areas listed in Sec. 18-18(b) shall be exempted from minimum horizontal illuminance and average horizontal illuminance requirements specified within subsection 30-6.12(E).
  - b) Nature parks, centers and conservation areas shall comply with applicable requirements of this subsection specifying average uniformity ratios and maximum uniformity ratios.
  - c) The City Manager or designee may determine, upon review of development plans for facilities listed under Section 18-18(a) or 18-18(c), that proposed outdoor lighting meets the general requirements of 30-6.12(D), and may apply the exemptions of this subsection to those facilities.

### Outdoor Lighting Code Sec. 30-6.12

- A. Purpose. To provide regulations for outdoor lighting that will:
  - 1. Protect and promote the public health, safety, and welfare;
  - 2. Promote safety and security in vehicular use and pedestrian use areas;
  - 3. Protect adjacent properties, the environment and wildlife and the night sky from adverse lighting impacts such as light pollution, light trespass, glare, excessive lighting, and offensive light sources;
  - 4. Promote energy and resource efficient lighting;
  - 5. Encourage the use of crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED) fundamentals in the design of lighting installations; and
  - 6. Promote the safety and security of pedestrians and motorists, especially at intersections, street crossings, and mid-block crossings.

#### Artificial Lighting at Night (ALAN) Wildlife Impacts

- Predator/prey dynamics, i.e. bats and amphibians
- Reproductive behaviors
- Impacts to biological functions, i.e. salamander tail regeneration
- Migratory birds, collisions
- Insect attraction, white LED lighting

#### PRCA Vision 2020 Master Plan & 2023 Update

- September 2011 Public survey, needs assessment
- Over 20 interviews, focus group meetings and public workshops
- Top priority identified improve and upgrade existing parks and facilities
- PRCA improvements to lighting, pedestrian areas and vehicular use areas





Figure 22: Responses to public opinion survey question # 17


- Desired park programming improvements identified

- Nature programming and environmental education again a top priority

## Comprehensive Plan - Relevant Sections 2024-410B

- Conservation, Open Space & Groundwater Recharge Element Objective 2.4: The City shall amend its land development regulations as necessary to conserve...listed species of plants and animals; significant natural communities, and other significant natural and archaeological resource areas...
- **Recreation Element Objective 2.2:** Acquire, design and manage parks to preserve **existing natural features** and their functions as described by the "Environmental Management of Public Parks & Open Spaces" portion of the Conservation, Open Space, and Groundwater Recharge Element.
- **Recreation Element Objective 3.1:** Develop programs that increase citizen awareness of urban area natural features and parks that obtain citizen input on current and future recreational needs.

## Comprehensive Plan - Relevant Sections

- ❖ Future Land Use Element Goal 4: The future land use element shall foster the unique character of the city by directing growth and redevelopment in a manner that: uses neighborhood centers to provide goods and services to city residents; protects neighborhoods; distributes growth and economic activity throughout the city in keeping with the direction of this element; preserves quality open space; and preserves the tree canopy of the city. The future land use element shall promote statewide goals for compact development and efficient use of infrastructure.
- ❖ Future Land Use Element Objective 4.2: The City shall implement regulations that will protect low-intensity uses from the negative impacts of high-intensity uses and provide for the healthy coexistence and integration of various land uses.
